

Rescue Program

We run one of the largest ex-battery hen rescue in the United States. To date, we have rescued 583 hens, 50 roosters, 10 ducks, 10 turtles, 2 rabbits, 2 pigs, and 1 rat.

Our rescue program aims not only to provide birds with a second chance at life, but also to make it possible for people who may not otherwise "know" birds to get to know them as companions and not just egg producing machines.

Despite their deprived lives, ex-battery hens consistently make wonderful companions to humans who make the efforts to give them a new life filled with love. Our adopters have overwhelmingly commented on how sweet, personable and trusting their adopted birds are, in spite of their past not-so-pleasant lives.

Who are we?



We are a 501c(3) non-profit animal sanctuary in Southern California's Temescal Valley.

Our mission is founded on the core philosophy that all animals are unique individuals deserving of compassion, care, love, and respect. Every animal who comes into our care – whether a mammal or a bird – gets a fair chance for the best possible life.

We provide permanent sanctuary to 100+ animals, routinely take in abandoned animals and provide them with safe haven, critical / veterinary care, and network for the best possible permanent placements for them.

While our residents are comprised of chickens, ducks, geese, pigeons, parakeets, reptiles, pigs, we emphasize particularly on the plight of birds used by the egg industry, commonly known as "battery hens". We run one of the largest ex-battery hen rescue programs in the United States. What makes our rescue program stands out is that we consistently synergize opportunities to help displaced roosters as part of the process.

Little Red Bird Sanctuary is managed by its Board and all of our work is 100% supported and funded by volunteers/grassroots.

Why do we do what we do?

Our founder and each of our Board members discovered their love and compassion for animals early on in their lives and were eager to do something meaningful to help. As a young adolescent, after learning the plight of hens in the egg industry, Cerise knew she wanted to dedicate her life to helping these beings. She promised herself she will rescue chickens against all odds.

In 2013, she converted her own home into an animal sanctuary that is now known as Little Red Bird Sanctuary.

In the sanctuary's first official year, Cerise spent her 26th birthday working on what is closest to her heart – driving 250 miles to an egg farm to rescue 23 (the maximum number of birds she was able to fit into her car at the time) battery hens who were discarded as piles of trash.

While there is misery and suffering everywhere, battery hens are arguably the most tortured souls on Earth. Our mission is not only to improve the lives of those individuals whom we cross paths with today, but also to alleviate the suffering of future generations by educating the public of their plight, change public perception of chickens and make the world a better place for chickens.
