- DIRECTOR

According to the official homepage of the United Nations on 'Climate Change,' "climate change is the defining issue of our time and we are at a defining moment. From shifting weather patterns that threaten food production, to rising sea levels that increase the risk of catastrophic flooding, the impacts of climate change are global in scope and unprecedented in scale."¹ We are faced with the growing threat on human existence and environment. The expeditious after-effects of climate change are the habitat destruction, crop failure, human migration, health hazards and poverty. We have not counted the poor in the country for nearly a decade now and it does not mean that scale of poverty has been reduced.

Keeping all these predicaments due to climate change in mind we are working on a spectrum of issues and problems existing in the society. Let me state that our intervention to a social problem or a cause is based on the policies and guidelines of State and Central Governments and the international organizations like the United Nations, World Health Organization, UNICEF, etc.

The Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (PWD) envisions that we need to work to change attitudes and approaches to Persons with Disabilities. With this end in view we work through Samanvaya and two Aastha projects. We cater to 2000+ Persons with Disabilities through three of our projects. We are reaching out to 7454 HIV/AIDS patients through two Vihaan Care and Support Centres. Over the years we could form 1655 SHGs to empower the women in the rural villages through Saksham program. The work of Childline team is remarkable as they become the saviour for Children in Need of Care and Protection (CNCP).

WHO mentions life-skills as the abilities for adaptive and positive behaviour to deal with the demands and challenges of everyday. In conformity with this, we could reach out to 3804 adolescent students in 24 Zilla Parishad schools. We approach malnutrition through a holistic approach and we have found it very successful. Connecting with the Government machinery we could facilitate 3798 schemes and entitlements to the people in need under the aegis of our Samardhan program. We are grateful to "L' Oeuvre d' Orient" for helping us to train women and youth in skill development program. The Sangli Mission Society gives utmost importance to tree plantation and allied activities to protect the environment through Harita program. We are also happy we could help the flood affected people in Kerala with our timely help. As an answer to the growing concerns of health, Sangli Mission Society has begun Santhome Ayurvedic Arogya Kendra in order to take care of the health issues of people through natural health remedies.

May I take this opportunity to keep on record my sincere thanks to all the donors, partners, well-wishers and the like-minded people who have been part and parcel of our tedious, yet beautiful, journey of helping the people in need. It is my honour to thank the President and the Governing Body Members of the Sangli Mission Society for their timely help, interventions and guidance. 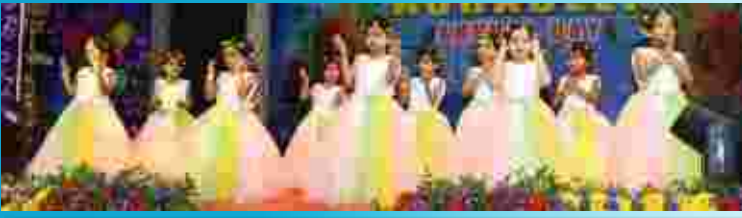

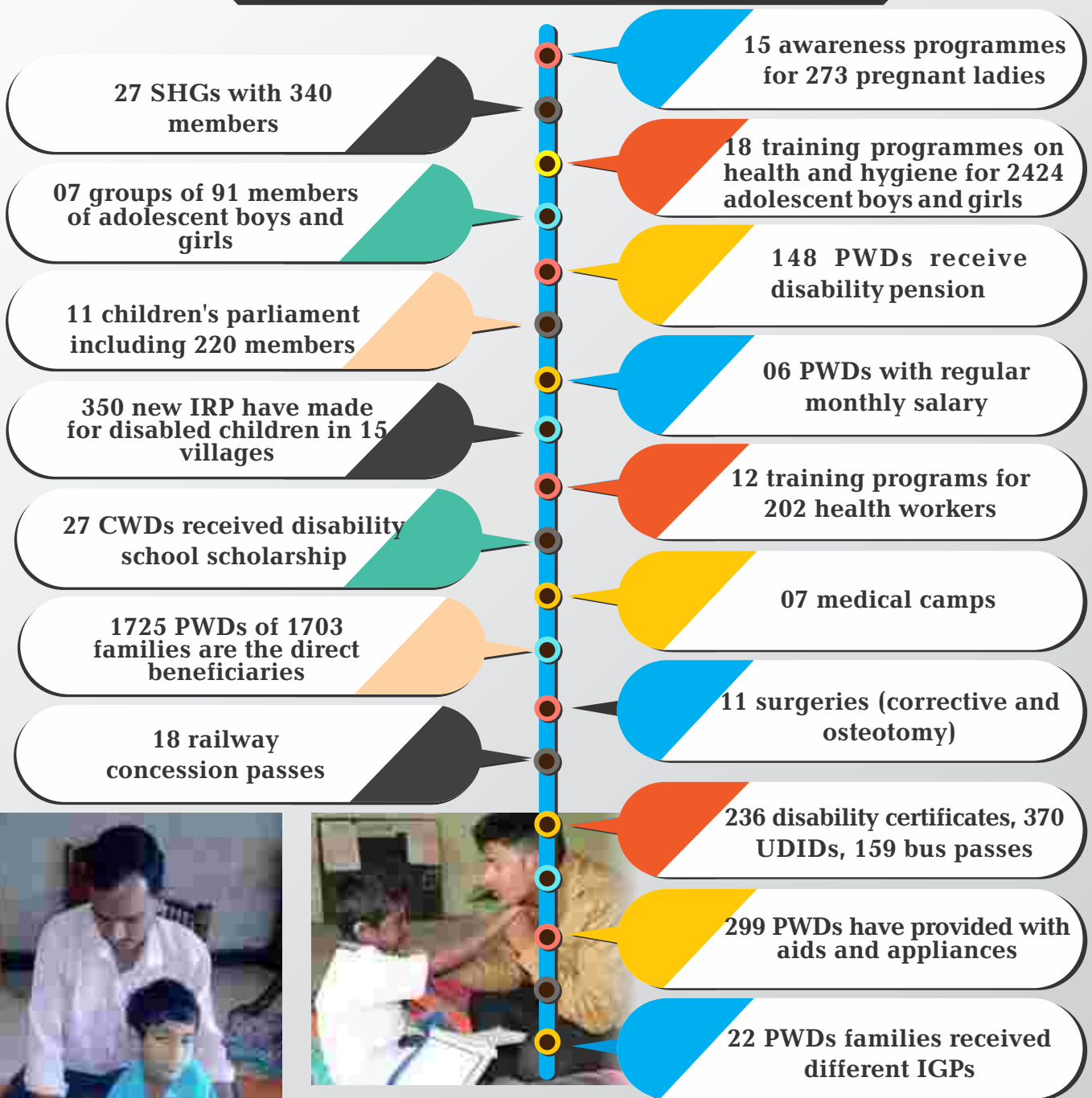

DILASA

Program for the HIV/AIDS infected and affected people

Sangli Mission Society started working for HIV/AIDS infected and affected people in early 1990s and this program got institutionalized under the banner – DILASA by 2004. It is catering to the needs of PLHIVs (Persons Living with HIV/AIDS) in two ways as Institution Based Rehabilitation (IBR) and Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR).

1. Dilasa Bhavan, Miraj

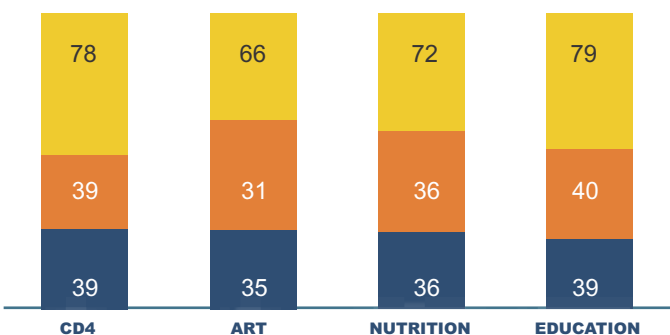
Dilasa Bhavan is the home for the HIV/AIDS infected girls and boys who are single/double orphan after the model of Institution Based Rehabilitation (IBR). This centre provides the children with all the facilities related to their education, medication, health and accommodation free of cost. At present there are 60 children; 25 boys and 35 girls. There are ten staff working in Dilasa Bhavan.

3. Nirmal Sadan, Amberi

Nirmal Sadan Amberi is a hostel for the girls who are in need of special care and protection. This is managed by Medical Sisters of St Joseph. Girls from poor financial background, HIV affected, semi orphans, etc. are admitted here. Nirmal Sadan aims at the holistic development of these children and is well appreciated by the public.

4. Vihaan Care and Support Center (CSC)

Vihaan CSC is a national initiative to provide expanded and holistic care and support services to PLHIVs and Sangli Mission Society is implementing two Vihaan Care and Support Centres in Sangli (Miraj) and Kolhapur (Ichalkaranji) Districts.

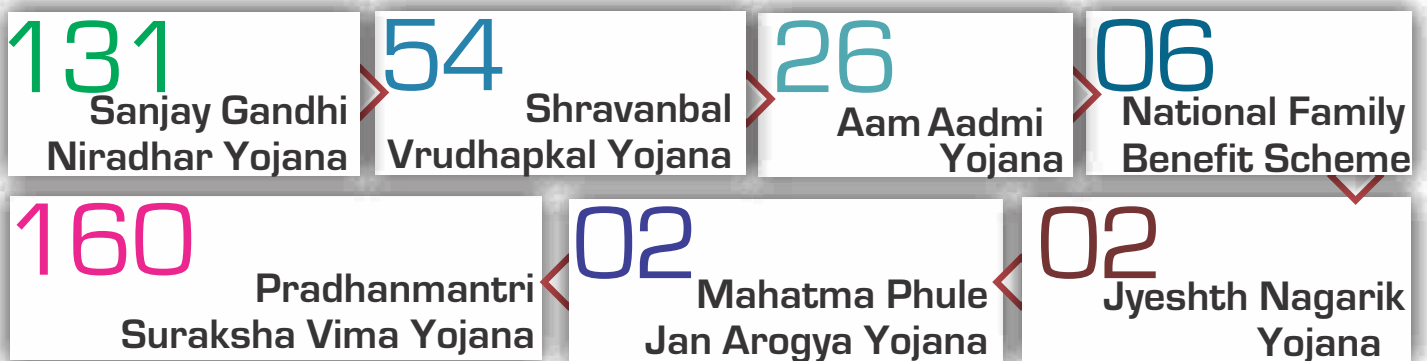


SHG Gradation

Santhome Ayurvedic Arogya Kendra

Santhome Ayurveda Arogya Kendra is an initiative of SMS to undertake public healthcare through health centre and hospital, community based activities, research, awareness, assistance and other related activities in the village based facilities. It is an ayurvedic and naturopathic health centre with the purpose of promoting integral health of human beings which includes cure, prevention and promotion. This centre is located in the western slop of the Western Ghats at Sateli, Bhedshi in Dodamarg tehsil of Sindhudurg district. We are committed to preventive healthcare, reducing child and maternal mortality, promote intake of nutritious food and protecting communities from infectious diseases. The social determinants like knowledge, attitudes, social and cultural norms and behaviours too play an important role in health at the individual, family, and community levels. These social and behaviour change interventions, complement and enhance accessible public health services, such as counseling, testing and treatment, awareness programs and house visits. The rationale of the project is that ayurveda considers human as a part of environment and believes that true health can be achieved through a holistic approach that targets physical, mental and social well-being. This project is partially supported by Italian Bishops' Conference.

CASE STORY

1

AASTHA

Aditya, a 17 year old physically handicapped boy living in a village in Kolhapur district, belongs to a middle class family, who could not afford to buy a wheel chair. Aditya first came into the limelight during the survey conducted in the village by our CBR team. His father shared all the information regarding his physical condition. Aditya was given a wheelchair from the beginning of our intervention from the CHAI-LF project. It brought a lot of confidence in him and the main benefit for him was that he could move around with the help of the wheelchair as he wished. Later the CBR team conducted several counseling sessions with his parents and understood that they wanted to start an income generating activity. CBR project gave them a flour mill which can be operated in the house itself and it will generate sustainable income for the family. Now Aditya runs the flour mill with the help of the wheel chair. He has become an independent entrepreneur earning Rs. 5000/- monthly. The project could really make his life meaningful.

2

Omkar a 13 year old boy was suffering from cerebral palsy by birth. He had scissor legs and as a result, he could not move his legs. He was moving from one place to another by dragging his body. He was not even able to move his fingers of his right hand and open his right fist. It was very difficult that he also was not able to sit straight due to his stiff muscles and nerves. His parents are very poor that they were struggling for their daily food. His parents were not ready for corrective surgery because they feared something wrong would happen to him. Initially he was given the therapies at home by the project physiotherapist and the CEC (Community Empowering Centre) teacher. It was astonishing that after 03 months of therapy there was 30% improvement in the movement of his hands and legs. Seeing the improvement in him, his parents were surprised and they began to bring him to CEC regularly. He was given continuous physiotherapy by the therapist and also by his parents. In the medical camp arranged by Aastha project, the doctors suggested to the parents that there will be improvement in him through the corrective surgery; therefore on August 2018 he underwent multiple surgeries of his legs at Bharti Hospital, Sangli. After the corrective surgery he was given calipers and regular physiotherapy. It is amazing that at present he is able to stand with the help of a support. Seeing this miracle the poor parents could express nothing but tears.

3

SAKSHAM

I am Ashwini, living in a remote village in Sangli district. I have been running a beauty parlor in my house without much facilities and used to get only meagre income. Earlier I was unaware of the group called Self Help Group (SHG), then through a staff of Sangli Mission Society, I got to know how they were empowering women through Saksham program. Then, I decided to go forward and formed SHG of 20 women. Through this we could save Rs. 2000/- per month and after 15 months of saving I received a loan of Rs. 25000/- for the renovation of the beauty parlor which I am running. Now because of the improved facilities, the number of customers has increased and I am earning minimum Rs. 1000/- per day. I am grateful to Sangli Mission Society for empowering me through the project.

4

Shafkat, now the secretary of an SHG named Chandini was working in a micro insurance company. Until she met SMS staff, she was not interested in SHGs or in any other groups. One day unexpectedly she met one of our staff and the staff explained to her about the organization and our activities. So, from her she understood about the program, called Saksham and its activities of empowering women through SHGs. She was so influenced and interested to make a SHG in her area. For that, along with other 20 women she made an SHG in her area. After that they were able to link the SHG with the Panchayath and that made changes in their lives, particularly, Shafkat received Rs. 100000/- as a loan and that helped her to move ahead more confidently. She resigned from the micro insurance company and started her own business. She later reflected that this was possible only through the help of Sangli Mission Society and its guidance in empowering poor village women.

CASE STORY CHILDLINE

5

Childline received a phone call stating that a girl who had been absent from her home for five days had come back and the parents were not able to handle the girl. CL decided to give them counseling and succeeded in convincing the girl and her parents about the need of education and could change the behavioral issues to a certain extent. But after one month CL received another phone call informing that the same girl was getting married and the family had arranged a reception. The team went to the location and came to know that the information was right. Childline informed this to the Police Station and contacted DySP. So he allowed the Police to handle the case. Childline informed this case to DWCD, CWC and DCPU. So they got the parents and the girl to the Police Station and with their help CL could cancel the marriage and the function they had arranged for her. After this, Childline presented them to the CWC and they decided to keep her in the Girls' Observation Home up to 18 years of age. Today she is a studious student with higher dreams and she is a good friend of CL.

6

During an outreach awareness, a mother approached the Childline and shared the situation about her girl child and the family. Her child is 13 years old and stopped attending school from 8th Std. The father of the child is a truck driver and he seldom takes any responsibility of the child and the household. Since their financial condition is very weak, mother could not fulfill the basic needs of the child. Due to lack of attention towards the child, she started stealing things from the house as well as from neighbor's house and the neighbors kept on complaining about the behavior of the child. CL understood the seriousness of the issue and registered the case for follow up. CL made a home visit and prepared a report based on the information available. Childline also collected information from the neighbors because they also had complaint against the behavior of the child. CL presented the report to CWC and suggested for the urgent need of shelter for the parent is unable to protect the child. As per the guidance from CWC, the child and mother got presented before the Child Welfare Committee and they heard the child and mother. After hearing, the CWC provided shelter for the child in the children home. With continuous follow-up and guidance, the child has improved in behavior and she is attending classes regularly.

HITGUJ

7

I am Arnav, a class 10 student who got help from the Hitguj School Counseling program run by Sangli Mission Society. My school invited Hitguj team to guide the students to prepare them before the final exams to build our confidence and reduce the stress. They motivated us through many activities, especially through games and discussions. Like my friends, I was so worried about the final exam, even though I used to get good marks in exams. I knew my studies and pre-exams were going to be great, but I was scared about the final exams and my career. The team explained us some general doubts and solutions. When I got the timetable, I made a study timetable for myself. As per that I planned to study minimum 4 hours daily. The day before the exam, I started vomiting profusely, however I practiced stress management and breathing activities which were explained by the team Hitguj. I did my exams very well and I am expecting a good result. I am so grateful to them for making me confident and manage my stress.

8

I am Adil studying in 8th standard. I used to spend a lot of time using mobile phone and playing games in mobile was my hobby. Because of the continuous use of phone I had severe headache, watery eyes, and weight gain. One day team HITGUJ came with the topic of social media and its consequences. They explained the topic with relevant examples. I was able to see myself in their stories. That made me aware of the severity of the problem. I figured out that it was an addiction. After the counseling I got clarity about my status. As per their instruction I started reducing the use of mobile phone. I uninstalled all the game apps from my phone and gradually I started focusing on studies than games. Since then I started sleeping on time and I began to see changes in my life. Now I have time for everything and I am playing outdoor games with my siblings and neighbors.

CASE STORY

SAMARDHAN

9

“I am Vandana, living in Haripur village along with my in-laws and children. I and my mother-in-law became the bread winners of the family as I lost my husband few years back. My mother-in-law is going for daily wages and I am working as a maid. One day I met Priti Kadam and after hearing about my difficulties she explained to me about the social schemes like Sanjay Gandhi Niradhar Pension Yojana. With her help I applied for it and now I am getting Rs. 900/- per month to meet my basic needs. She also helped us to get ration because my card was blocked due to some documentation problem. I joined SMS's SHG group and now I am saving Rs.200/- per month. Priti ma'am helped us to open an account in Sukanya Yojana for my daughter and she is depositing Rs. 1000/- per month as her saving. Now I am able to look after my family without much tension, I am thankful to SMS”.

SWALAMBAN

11

“Through some SHG members I got to know that SMS is conducting a training on fashion designing in our village. I wasn't interested for attending this training but due to the force of my parents and siblings I went for the class just for the sake of attending. I was totally new to the area of designing and tailoring. I was worried and disinterested so I decided to meet the SMS representative. After talking to Snehalata ma'am, my confidence got increased and I decided to continue the training under the trainer, Mrs Suvarna. Under her guidance we learned different types of dress making and we were awarded the course certificate too. As a trainer she trained us very well, beyond our expectation. Today I am so happy that I could learn to design dress for me and for my family members”.

10

“I am Pramila, living in Haripur village along with parents, in-laws and children. I am a daily wager and due to the bad health condition of my husband, we couldn't make a saving. We had to spend all the savings for the treatment. After the death of my husband the whole responsibility was upon me. I struggled a lot for meeting the both ends of our life. I took a loan for my daughter's marriage. I applied for Aam Admi Bima Yojana. I went to the office of the 'Thalatti' and submitted all the documents but nothing happened. I went so many times for enquiring about that. I tried my best to get the money to close the loan which I had taken for my daughter's marriage. One day I met one of the SMS staff through my friend and I shared my issues with her. After our discussion she went to meet the officials and helped me to complete the procedures. She gave me a ray of hope in my life. She also told me to apply for Sanjay Gandhi Niradhar Pension Yojana. As per her guidance I submitted my documents again and completed the procedures. Now, I received Rs. 30000/- from Aam Admi Bima Yojana and I closed my loan with that money. I also got gas cylinder through Ujjwala Gas Yojana by the help of SMS, Thank you SMS”.

12

“My name is Mohini, living in Chinchni village along with my husband and two children. My husband is an alcoholic and I am the one who runs the family. It was a tough task for me to manage everything. One day I met a staff of Sangli Mission Society at the Grampanchayath meeting. She explained to me about their projects and how Sangli Mission Society is helping people for their empowerment. Through her guidance I attended one training program on business management conducted by Sangli Mission Society. That training made me confident enough to start a new business of making 'agarbatti'. I discussed this plan with my husband and he got interested for the same. So we bought a machine for making the 'agarbatti' which costed Rs. 125000/-. We took a loan for buying this and we started selling this in our village and the neighboring villages. Through this business we earn minimum Rs. 1000/- per day. And I am so happy that now we repaid our loan and bought a two wheeler from the profit. Now other people are also influenced by the change happened to our family and some of them started their own business taking training and loan from SMS and now we all earn very good income”.

CASE STORY

SAMANVAYA

13

“Who will take care of my child after me, Lord don’t punish my child so much” used to be the loud cry of late Mrs Vidya, the mother of Siddhesh as she would come to meet teachers in Anugraha Special School. Sisters used to console her by saying that God has a plan. He was given admission in our school in 2002. He learned to read and write and also learned counting numbers without any mistakes. He attended the vocational training program in our special school and learned envelop cutting and pasting, packaging and parceling. He also used to arrange the files in the school office. We are very happy and proud that he is selected for a job in a shoe shop in our town. Now he earns Rs 4000/- per month from his job. A year ago he lost his mom. At present he is staying with his uncle and aunt. They are also getting old and now they may depend on Sidhesh who is the only earning member for them. The cry of his mother in front of God is heard.

15

Rohit 21 years old was born in a low economic family. He is a hearing impaired teenager with mild intellectual disability. He is elder in the family, and stays with his younger sibling who is recently married. His father is an electrician working in a TV shop. Mother is a housewife. Hearing impairment is a genetically transferred problem in their family. Rohit is a physically fit and tall boy. He is using hearing aid for both the ears. He was admitted to Ashadeep Special School in 2006. Over the years he has improved a lot. He is good at sports, cultural activities and has won prizes in many competitions held in school and interschool levels. He passed his MSCIT with 84% marks. Now he appeared for 12th std NIOS Exam and Tally 9 exam. He is also trained in making incense sticks, warli paintings on bags and photo-frames, data entry, baking and cooking, etc.

He is able to ride bicycle and two wheelers. At home he helps his mother in household work. During free time after school he works with a family as a helper who has a café shop and dairy. He also goes for plucking Mongara flowers for making Gajara for selling. He goes with his father to learn electrical repair work.

14

Vaibhav was born in a poor family. His elder brother Keshav too is a mentally challenged child. Keshav, a former student of Jeevdan, is employed in a flour mill with a minimum salary. Their father died when they were young. Their only sister who is elder to Vaibhav has completed degree and is doing a job in a private enterprise. Mother is not physically fit for any work. Fathers' pension and Keshav's earnings are the only income for the family. Vaibhav is physically fit and tall. His IQ is 40 and is with moderate mental retardation. He is always very active and interested in manual works. He was admitted to Jeevdan Special School in 2008. Over the years he has improved very much. At present he is trained in small trades like making foot mat, incense sticks, floor cleaning liquids, etc. He also attends computer classes where he is being trained for data entry. Vaibhav has very well developed communication skills. He is appointed in Jeevdan as a supporting staff from June 2016. His income will be an additional financial support for the mother to run the family.

Krutika is a nine year old female child with severe intellectual disability and cerebral palsy. Her parents are agricultural labourers and are economically backward. When she was admitted to Pratiksha Special School in 2014 she could only sit and was not able to get up or walk. The staff identified that the main service child needed is physiotherapy. As a result of physiotherapy she can get up by holding the table or chair. She can eat with own hands and drink water / tea holding the glass. She has improved her physical functionality. There is amazing progress in gross motor and fine motor skills. At present the child is given toilet training and other self-help skills. Child has started to identify colors, objects and respond to sounds. Parents are very much happy with the progress of the child. When they took child for the summer holidays they were overwhelmed by the improvement made by the child.

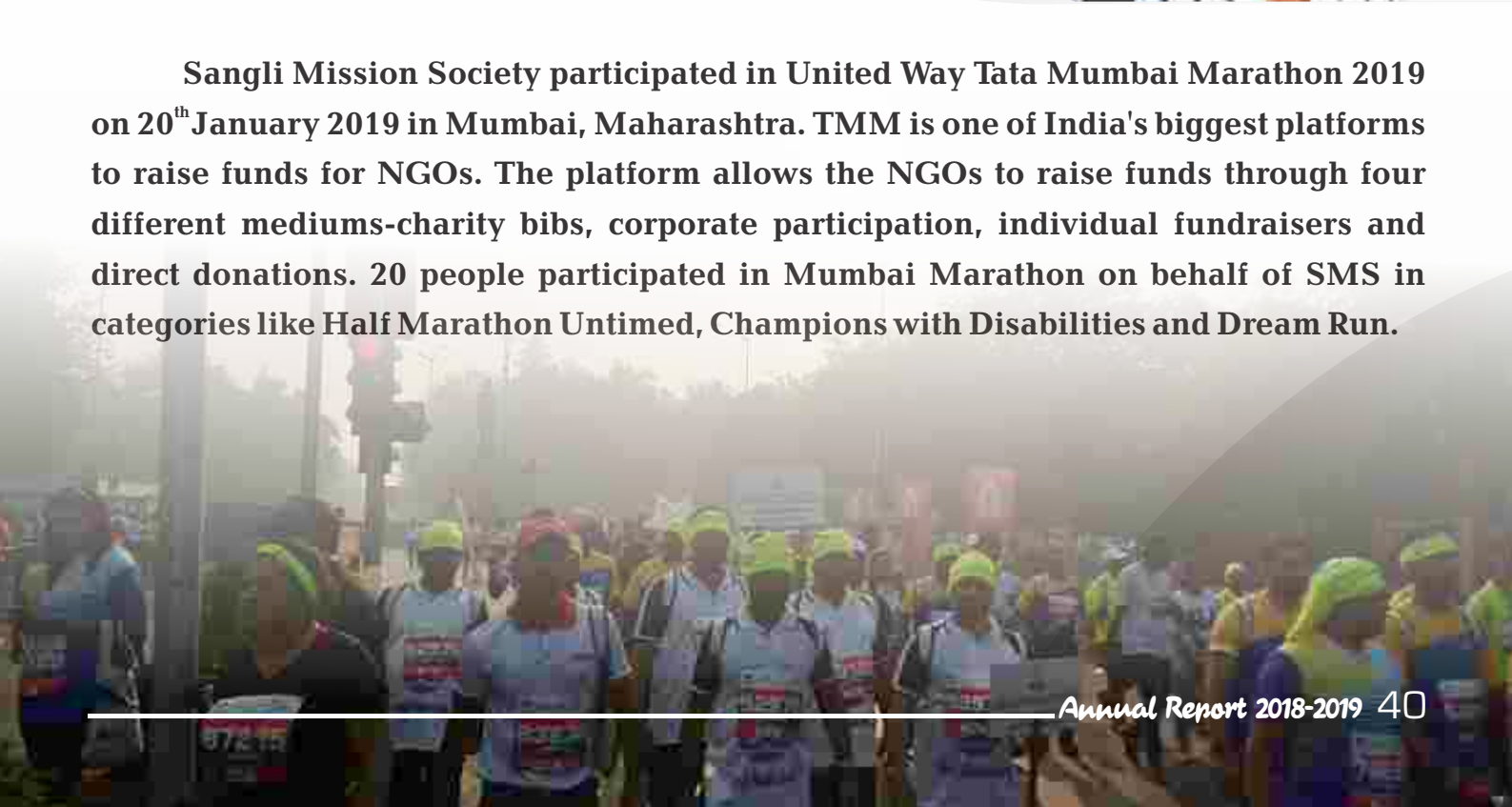

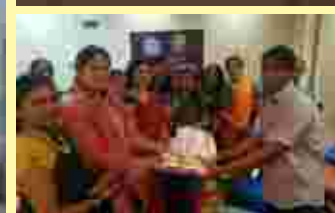
