

Barangay Buenavista Palompon, Leyte

Region VIII Population: 1375

The last coastal Barangay to the south of Palompon, it got its name for the Spanish words "Buena Vista", meaning good view. Aside from reaching the place by pumpboat, it can also be reached by taking a land trip through the concrete Palompon-Isabel national highway. Upon reaching Tabunok you turn to the right using a barangay road now partly concreted. The road to Buenavista will pass through barangays Magsaysay, Canipaan, Cantuhaon and Duljugan. Buenavista is located at the edge of a cape that will give one a panoramic view of Camotes Sea and the island of Cebu. Buenavista is one of the sources of boneless danggit and one of the biggest sources of shellfish. It has a barangay water system and its power for electricity is provided by LEYECO V Electric Cooperative.
