Summary	Bali Life is a foundation, which was established 11 years ago to
	provide hope and a future to the underprivileged children of Bali.
	Our vision since inception has been to not only provide vulnerable
	and disadvantaged children with restoration, healing and a home,
	but also to equip them with practical skills to enhance their future
	employment prospects and also benefit their communities of
	origin.
	In line with this vision Bali Life Street Kids Centre & Women
	Workshop was established in 2014 in order to address the issues
	of disadvantaged children and their mothers engaged in begging
	on the streets to earn an income. By providing a free, safe, secure



and supportive environment through our Street Kids Informal School many street children are now being educated five days a week. They are also being fed a breakfast snack plus lunch at school.

Through the Women's Workshop the mothers of children attending the school have through education and training been able to earn an income paid daily as well as increase their ability to secure other paid work outside the Centre.

Currently there are approximately 30 – 40 children attending the Centre five days a week, 10 – 15 women attending the Women's Workshop and between 40 – 50 children and women.

Other children and their mothers at risk begging on the street who do not attend the Centre is engaged through our mobile street van which three times a month.. The van is stocked with food packs, educational equipment, practical/hygienic supplies and medical supplies. There are between 80-90 children and women accessing the van three times a month.

Proven outcomes from this project clearly show that children and women are utilising the Centre regularly. Some children have moved onto mainstream education with more following.

In order to continue this vital work Bali Life relies on financial donations to meet the on going and increasing cost of running the Centre. As numbers of children and women increase so do the costs. Future plans include renting the property next door to the Centre in order to expand the Women's Workshop and increasing the space in the Centre for the children.

The Bali Life Street Kids Centre & Women Workshop continues to impact children and women who are at risk begging on the streets by providing them with education, training and practical skills to increase their future employment opportunities and benefit their communities of origin.

Please describe the mission of your organisation (i.e. who the are beneficiaries, what is your goal, how you work to achieve the mission of your organisation)

Bali Life Street Kids Centre & Women Workshop is an innovative charity using a dual armed approach to address the issues of disadvantaged and at risk children and women engaged in begging on the streets.



Our Mission is to provide a safe, secure and supportive schooling environment at the Centre for the children through our Street Kids Informal School. To enable us to locate new students for the school, plus supporting children on the street who are unable to attend the Centre, we use a mobile street van to reach them.

The second arm of our mission is to empower women by providing an opportunity for the mothers of the children attending the Centre to earn a daily wage by working at the Women's Workshop also located in the Centre.

The Goal of the project is to stop children and their mothers begging on the streets exposing them to danger and vulnerability such as sexual exploitation. Through education and training we believe individuals can be empowered, raise their standard of living and enhance their future beyond the streets, enabling them to live a life of dignity and pride and thereby impacting future generations.

The Beneficiaries of the organisation come from a poor and dis-advantaged background. The target group is primarily children and their mothers living in the slum areas of Monang-Maning, Denpasar who go to the streets to beg and sell bracelets.

The secondary target group is poor and disadvantaged children and their mothers from slum areas who do not beg on the street.

Our programs at the Centre for the children are held in two classrooms. We have a library, a large indoor play area and an outdoor area for games. This is an informal school geared for children who have not normally been in school. The methods of teaching the children are based on child centred learning which is interactive and fun.

Recently we have been able to offer a student the opportunity to enter mainstream education through sponsorship. There are currently other students who will also be able to take up this opportunity. Thus providing the means plus the opportunity for these children to secure a much brighter future than they would have had previously.

The Women's Workshop within the Centre provides an opportunity for the mothers to learn new skills, such as handicraft and jewellery so that they can gain an income away from the streets.

A normal day is from 9am – 4pm and customers who contact Bali Life to request us to make their product provide the work. Each woman is paid a daily/weekly amount.

**The Street Kids Centre & Women Workshop** is located at Jalan Gunung Karang #19, Pamecutan Kelod Denpasar Barat ,Monang Maning Denpasar 80119, Bali-Indonesia

Please describe the activities that you will undertake in this project. Please be specific as possible

The Street Kids Centre has implemented the following activities to achieve their mission within the Centre

- Established a 5 day a week informal school program for the children
- Mobilised a van or bikes that picks up the children everyday for school and delivers them home in the afternoon.
- Provided a breakfast snack and lunch for the children
- Implemented a curriculum where the focus is to address concerns about the absence of a basic education, the dangers present for children on the street such as exploitation, abuse, health and safety and the challenges they are likely to face in the future.
- The curriculum is used with elementary school aged children so that they can learn basic skills, develop a better understanding of their lives and establish attitudes and qualities that will help bring about personal fulfilment and positive change in their community.
- The ultimate aim of the curriculum is to begin the process of integrating children back into mainstream schooling or achieve formal schooling through the Package A, B, C system. (Bridging School)
- Provide stationary for the children, resource books, desks, chairs.
- The program currently uses one full time volunteer to teach elementary school
- And one teacher to work with older children to prepare them to transition into mainstream education.
- · Provided volunteers to work with the staff
- Implemented a behaviour management strategy with the focus on maintaining a safe classroom for all children.

**The Women's Workshop**, which has space for 5 – 15 women, runs five days a week between the hours of 9am – 4pm. The women who come are the mothers of the children attending school at the Centre.

• The women are taught how to make whatever the customer has requested e.g. handicrafts, jewellery, etc. there are also sewing machines which can be used. They



are paid daily/weekly.

- The women are supervised and trained by Bali Life staff.
- The aim of the workshop is not only to provide the women with a regular income but also to encourage them to eventually stop going to the street with their children to beg.

In order to reach the children and mothers who do not come to the Centre, Bali Life provide a van, which goes to the streets of Kuta three times a month to feed and offer support to the people. Children and mothers are regularly contacted.

The van is stocked with food packs, educational equipment, practical/hygienic supplies and medical supplies.

The mobile van covers the major stops at all major intersections from the airport to McDonalds in Seminyak, Imam Bonjol Street, as well as stops on the foreshore of Kuta, the night market area in Melasti Street Area and Padma Street. If necessary deviations are made in search of other children.

Please describe the specific outputs that this project will produce. If possible, please include estimated timings of the project outputs

The Centre has been operating since July 2014 and has been supporting street children through education and their mothers through work opportunities. We believe that by continuing the work we have already started we will continue to have a positive impact on the lives of the beneficiaries that will result in them experiencing a better life with hope for a brighter future.

Our programs have already produced direct outcomes. These include:

- No of children: 30 children attending informal school on a regular basis
- No of Students: 4 children transitioning to mainstream education
- No of women: 12 women attending the workshop on a regular basis
- No of people: 45-50 people being given breakfast and lunch daily
- No of people: 70-90 people Receiving food packs etc when the van goes out
- Average income for a women over 1 week is IDR 350,000-450.000
- No of families: 5 families not going on the street to beg anymore
- No of families: 8 families going for significantly less time on the street to beg

It is expected that these numbers will continue to increase.

The project will continue to build on trust and friendship with the families thereby creating a "safe" environment for families to share their struggles and concerns. As trust is established there is an opportunity for open communication to address issues such as



domestic violence, abuse, neglect, etc often at the core of problems vulnerable women and children experience on a daily basis.

As the project continues to grow and reach more at risk families it is expected that the Centre will become a sought after option for these families.

Please describe the key beneficiaries in the community who will be helped by your proposed project. Please estimate how many beneficiaries will be impacted

The key beneficiaries of this project are poor and disadvantaged children and their mothers who are at risk engaged in begging on the streets.

The project also aims to support children on the street who are unable to attend the Centre due to parental resistance or geographical location through the use of a mobile street van, which operates three times a month.

The number of beneficiaries impacted by this project already is 70-90 people per night three times monthly when the street van goes out on the streets.

There are currently 5 - 15 women attending the Women's Workshop daily.

There are currently 30 Children attending our informal school 5 days a week at the Centre.

It is expected that these numbers will increase in the future

Please describe the anticipated outcomes associated with your request (please include estimated timings of the outcomes)

- As a result of the Street Kids & Women Workshop Centre project we would expect the following outcomes for our beneficiaries.
- Children attending the informal school will show improvement in their ability to read and write Bahasa and English Lesson, understanding of Math, develop in Sport, Music and Creativity
- They will show positive changes in their behaviour in terms of maintaining concentration in class, being respectful of teachers, a decline in aggressiveness towards other children, the ability to share with other children, to treat school property appropriately and be able to follow school rules.
- These improved skills will enable them to more easily transition to mainstream schooling where their success is greatly improved in staying long term.
- For the mothers attending the Women's Workshop it is expected that they will gain many more skills, which will increase their ability to continue working at the Centre or eventually, find appropriate paid work outside the Centre.
- It is expected that some of these women will start their own small businesses working from home.



Please provide details on how you will record the impact of your proposed project in terms of activities, outputs and outcomes. Recording the effects of all the programs at the Centre will be achieved through the following:

- Keeping accurate statistics school attendance, recording children's competency in subjects, number of women attending daily.
- Getting regular feedback from the people who are receiving the service about positive changes to their lives e.g able to buy healthier food for their families
- Conducting regular reviews of programs
- Informal conversations with children and their mothers with regard to time spent on the streets ... spending less and less time there?
- Following up with families who no longer "need" the Centre for schooling or paid work

Outcomes will be measured through short, medium and long-term goals being achieved.

## **Short Term Results**

- Ability to pay the lease on the current property due on July 15<sup>th</sup> 2017
- More children transitioning into mainstream education at the start of the school year in July this year

## **Medium Term Results**

- Ability to pay ongoing running costs... adequate staffing, electricity, food/milk, transport costs, internet, maintenance, other program costs etc
- Ability to pay the lease on the building next door to the Centre so that the mothers will have more space and the children will have more space in the current building.
- Numbers of children attending the Centre increasing
- Increase in numbers of children transitioning to mainstream school
- Children's health and well being improves

## **Long Term Results**

- Children graduating from mainstream school and either finding secure paid work or choosing to go onto higher education through University
- Mothers and children currently going to the street regularly to beg will discontinue doing this as they are able to secure enough income either in the Centre or outside paid work which is enough to meet their needs
