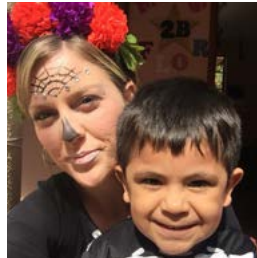

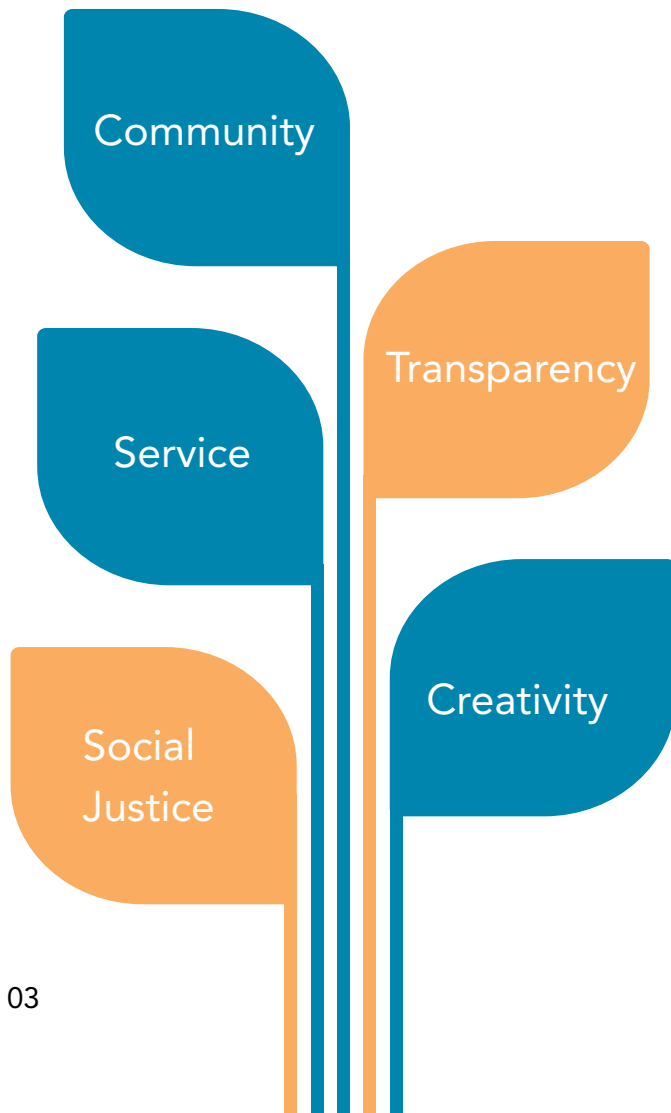


VISION

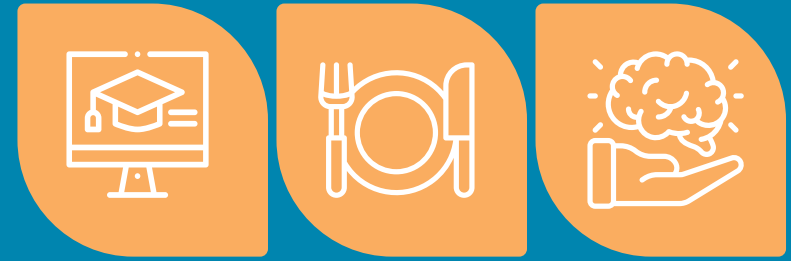

WHAT WE DO

Centro Infantil de los Angeles (Centro Infantil) provides excellent early childhood development that ensures **children's rights through health, nutrition, and educational programs**. We provide outstanding education for all our students, encourage gender equality, improve mental and physical health, and support every family's economic growth through upcoming expert lead workshops in entrepreneurialism.

We believe that education is the backbone for better futures. Our program provides a holistic learning approach to 120 students to prepare them to enter first grade. Our curriculum incorporates a **human rights and gender perspective** as well as a sustainability aspect to standard pre-k learning. In addition to our innovative curricula, our strengths-based approach works with students and their families to improve overall family nutrition, provide better economic opportunities for parents, and increase community engagement.



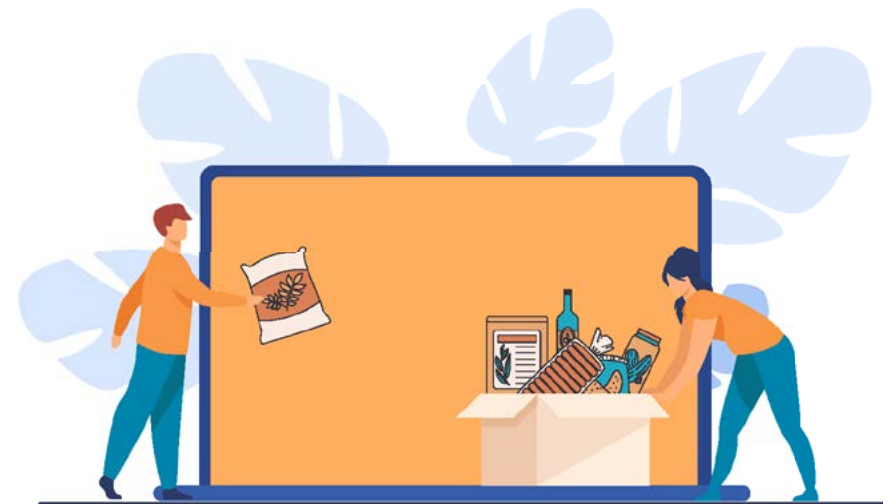
Centro Infantil was certified as a preschool in 2007, and since then our graduates have had an excellent record for staying in school and achieving above average academic results. A detailed study of 10 of our graduating classes revealed that **Centro Infantil graduates earned higher average grades than their peers in San Miguel** and in the entire State of Guanajuato. Given that our students come from the poorest families in San Miguel, we are extremely pleased and proud of these results. It is typical that academic performance increases with socio-economic strata, and the results that our students have obtained speak to the quality head start that we are giving them. It demonstrates that with care, compassion, and outstanding teaching young people from even the poorest families can continue their educations, perform above average, and have bright futures before them.

2020 IN REVIEW

This pandemic has shown us that education is vital as many children today cannot go to school. Thankfully, our program was able to continue through distance learning. Our Director trained Centro Infantil teachers to prepare and deliver weekly lessons and other resources for educational activities in the home. We provided parents with materials, schedules, teaching tips, and the hands on, support that they need to help their children continue learning.

Early in **COVID19 and quarantine in Mexico** (April 2020), Centro Infantil conducted individual family wellness checks and evaluations. These evaluations included employment status, household income, number of dependent family members in one house, and monthly expenses. Based on our findings, Centro Infantil identified families who were especially at-risk

or were already in crisis due to COVID19. These families make less than \$100 a month, which is far from enough to meet their basic needs. To tackle these issues, **we reached out to our individual donors and created a COVID19 Crisis Campaign to raise money and provide additional support** including special food deliveries face masks, digital thermometers, and other supplies. In 2021, Centro Infantil will continue to conduct wellness checks and evaluations with the most at risk families and to help them get back on their feet by providing food and other resources to the extent that we are able.





STATISTICS/RESULTS



1. Education

Daycare

As many of our supporters know, in May of 2020 our board of directors made the difficult decision to temporarily close our daycare effective in July. Of the 76 children whom we were serving in the daycare, 40 graduated to our preschool and began classes in August. We assisted the 7 daycare teachers in their job search, and all now have found other employment. We understand **how crucial childcare is for working parents** which is why we are working hard to find the resources to reopen the daycare as soon as possible.

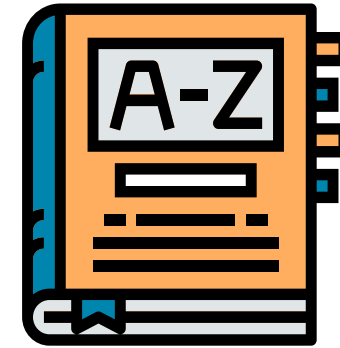
Preschool

Our preschool numbers held steady in 2020 with 120 students aged 3 to 6 in our preschool – sixty in the morning session and 60 in the afternoon. In July 40

students graduated from our daycare and went on to first grade in the public schools, and we admitted 40 new students from our daycare in August.

Director Patricia Palacios responded quickly when Mexico closed in-person classes in May, as we pivoted to deliver quality remote learning. **Patricia and the teachers prepared online classes as well as educational materials and activities for those families without access to internet.** We also upgraded the internet connections of our teachers so that they could work more effectively and at the same time be safe by practicing social distancing. Thanks to Patricia and her team of 6 teachers our students continued learning effectively with the invaluable assistance of their parents. We are very grateful that our wonderful parents have been eager to help their kids learn at home during the pandemic.

Our six preschool teachers held online class four times a week with their and provided activities and homework to those families who did not have access to internet. Each Monday those families received homework to turn in by the end of the week. We had a total of 408 online classes for the 17 weeks of fall classes.



In addition to our regular curriculum, Elizabeth town College student volunteers from their Center for Community and Civic Engagement Program provided English classes once a week. All of our students received these classes – from our three-year-olds to our six-year-olds – each class learned about colors, shapes, animals, fruits, vegetables and more. **Our students loved learning English** and had an amazing time singing and watching fun videos with the volunteers. Last semester we provided over 50 English classes and had fun activities during our end of year event – all to allow our kids the opportunity to continue practicing English.



As we begin 2021, our classes will remain online through the end of June. We are waiting to hear from the Guanajuato Ministry of Education if we will resume in-person classes **for the 2021-2022 school year or have hybrid** – online and in-person classes. Either way, our kids will be learning to the best of their abilities!

2. Health and Nutrition

In January, we arranged for the San Miguel Health Center to provide every child with their required vaccines and vitamins. At the beginning of quarantine our Director Patricia Palacios Cortes conducted check-ins with each individual family to understand their economic and health requirements. Each family was provided information regarding COVID19, state health protocols and places to receive treatment if symptomatic.

Before COVID shut down in person learning in May, Centro Infantil was serving over 440 substantial hot meals and snacks a day to all our students. From January to May we provided **196 children with hot meals and snacks while monitoring their nutrition levels.** All of this was done with the vital support of Feed the Hungry, which is a highly respected San Miguel NGO dedicated to fighting hunger in our region.

With the support of Feed the Hungry we continued to provide critical nutrition to our families even after school closures. **Every two weeks, families received a "dispensa" or grocery allotment from Feed the Hungry for each family.** Dispensas weigh approximately 30 pounds and they include non-perishables such as pasta, rice, cereals along with milk, and some produce items. We identified 40 families for whom the dispensas weren't enough, and with our own funds we provided additional food and cleaning supplies which included items such as mops, brooms, sponges, soap and detergent. Together, Centro Infantil and Feed the Hungry provided more than 2,500 dispensas and over 640 cleaning supplies packages to 200 families.

The health, social, and economic environment in San Miguel is constantly changing, and this is especially so since the pandemic struck. Centro Infantil makes every effort to adapt and to ensure that we are serving our target population in the best ways possible. We conduct annual check-ins and evaluations of our families to guarantee their needs are met. Based on last years diagnostic, we learned that **our families want to achieve their economic and educational goals** which is why we are planning to pilot the Women and Children Allies Network (WECAN).





3. Entrepreneurialism and Livelihoods Project

Gender inequality is a problem worldwide. Although each country and region vary, **the ability of women to make life choices to meet their own needs is significantly less than men.** The consequences are less education, inferior employment, lower wages, less or no opportunity to own property, and few social and political participation opportunities.

In Mexico, being a woman means facing several obstacles to your full development. According to the World Economic Forum, **Mexico is ranked 64 out in the 149 countries of the 2019 gender disparity report**¹. Machismo and a patriarchal system severely

affect opportunities for women. For example: Mexican women work primarily in the domestic sphere and men in the public sphere and as providers of household income². This gendered division of labor has caused inferior opportunities for women where they continue to be responsible for in home care activities and are therefore limited to outside opportunities.

According to UN Women, **the empowerment of women and their participation at all levels and sectors of economic activity is essential** for five specific developmental objectives: (1) building strong economies, (2) establishing more stable and fair societies, (3) achieving development and human rights objectives. (4) improving the quality of life of women, men, and communities, and (5) promoting business objectives and practices³.

In February of 2020, Centro Infantil conducted a baseline survey regarding the economic needs and priorities of participating mothers. Based on this diagnostic, Centro Infantil has taken the initial steps to implement **a new pilot program that will provide tools to the women who head the families of our students to improve their life opportunities.**

This project will ensure women are respected for their community contributions, develop healthy relationships that protect them from violence, break the cycle of poverty, and provide training and employment opportunities. **It empowers women by providing personal development workshops and business training delivered by community experts.** It will provide women with the tools to become community leaders and build better futures for their families.

Centro Infantil strives to identify and meet the needs of our community. Our program **provides childcare to women** so they can work while having peace of mind knowing their children are cared for in a safe and nurturing environment. We support women as they develop their personal goals, acquire new technical skills to improve their existing businesses, increase their incomes, and break the cycle of poverty.

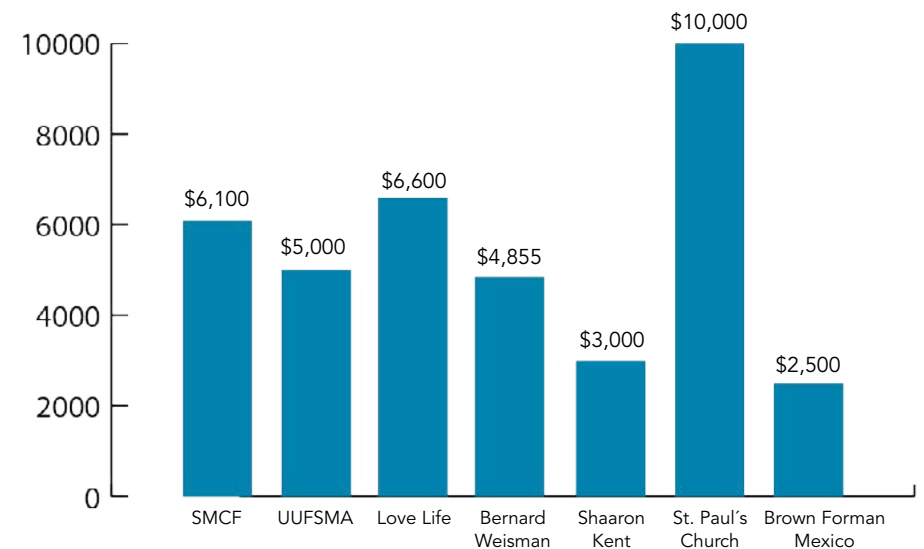


2020 FINANCIALS

end of 2020 we had **36 sponsors or 30% of our kids sponsored.** As part of our strategic fundraising plans, we hope to increase that to over 50% by the end of 2021.

Volunteer Program

Centro Infantil instituted its volunteer program over 15 years ago, and since then have over 2000 volunteers from 15 countries – a total of approximately 150,000 volunteer hours.

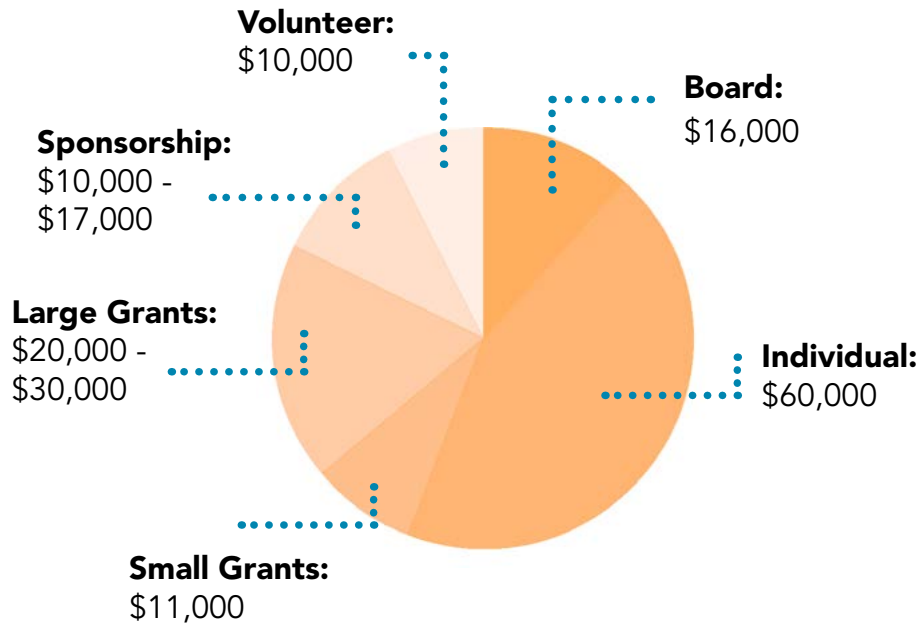
