What do we offer?

The High School Equivalency Test (HiSET) Preparation Review Course is designed to assist out of school adults prepare for the Official HiSET Exam and obtain their high school equivalency diploma. During new student orientation half the nonrefundable program fee will be do.

Why should I take the HiSET Exam?

Passing the HiSET test and earning your high school equivalency diploma opens doors.

- A high school equivalency credential can show employers you have the career readiness skills that allow you to get the job done.
- The high school equivalency credential is portable and accepted in any state. With the HiSET you are able register for college.
- The U.S. Military and other federal agencies recognize the HiSET exam as a legitimate qualifying test.
- The HiSET exam helps to identify which test takers are career and college ready

Upon completion of the HiSET test, participants will be invited to attend the annual HiSET graduate ceremony scheduled in May.

What is on the HiSET Exam?

The HiSET Exam can be taken on the computer or by paper. Candidate will be tested on the following five core areas:

- Language Arts Reading: 60 percent of the exam is Information Texts and 40 percent Literary Text. The exam is 65 minutes. The test has 50 multiple-choice questions.
- Language Arts Writing: 43 percent of the exam covers Language Facility, 35 percent Writing Conventions, 22 percent Organization of Ideas. The exam is 120 minutes with 61 multiple-choice questions, and one essay.
- Mathematics: 45 percent of the exam is Algebraic Concepts, 19 percent Numbers and Order of Operations, 18 percent Measurement/Geometry, and 18 percent Data Analysis/Probability/Statistics. The exam is 90 minutes with 55 multiplechoice questions.
- Science: 49 percent Life Science, 28 percent Physical Science, and 23 percent Earth Science. The exam is 80 minutes with 60 multiple choice.
- Social Studies: 35 percent History, 35 percent Civics/Government, 20 percent Economics, and 10 percent Geography. The exam is 70 minutes with 60 multiplechoice questions.
- Test takers can long on hiset.ets.org to view their test scores.
