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A Message from Our Leadership

More than a decade has passed since Stepping Stones International first opened its doors to orphaned and vulnerable youth in Mochudi. With the support of hundreds of local and international volunteers, sponsors and donors we have grown from an after school program with 30 children in a single village, to serving orphaned and vulnerable youth across Botswana through our national literacy, child protection and life skills programs.

We do this by actively engaging with youth and their families on various levels. Our psychosocial support, educational programs and leadership skills development will enable them to support themselves, their families and their communities.

To achieve our mission to unlock the potential of youth ages 12-25 through holistic development, enriching families and activating sustainable opportunities to become self-sufficient, Stepping Stones International works with youth to identify their challenges and find solutions to them. SSI also utilizes global best practices and methodologies that are adapted to suit the local context. Our service model is designed to meet the needs of children and youth at all levels – the individual, the family, service providers and the wider community – in order to build a network of support that enables vulnerable young people to succeed in life.

In 2017, we implemented literacy, life skills, child protection and psychosocial support programs in 10 districts across Botswana, many of which are highlighted in this report. This year we spent time reviewing the impacts of our programs, shared lessons learned and explored opportunities to improve quality and scale up our work to uplift the lives of young people.

Stepping Stones International was represented at several international forums this year, including the Universal Periodic Review in Geneva, the African Committee of Experts on the Rights and Welfare of a Child in Sudan, and the Child Rights Network for Southern Africa meeting in Botswana. Working in collaboration with our peers, we are helping to ensure young people in Botswana are able to reach their full potential.

In closing, we graciously thank our partners, who are central to our work, including the Government of Botswana and the House of Chiefs, for their leadership in initiating progress towards harmonizing child protection policies and activities and the European Union, PCI and USAID, Stephen Lewis Foundation, FACET Foundation, Barclays Bank, and BIHL for their generous financial support. Together we are building a brighter future for the young people of Botswana, and generations to come.



2017 – A Year of Achievement



Judo Champion takes Botswana by Storm

Stepping Stones International uses exposure to sporting activities, such as judo, to encourage young people to develop balance, flexibility and channel frustrations into a positive outlet.

Atang Setshwane joined our Judo Club in 2016. At just 15 years old, she already demonstrated talent and discipline, and quickly acquired new techniques. Her hard

work and dedication paid off when she brought home a silver medal from her first judo tournament in Gaborone.

Two weeks later, Atang went on to qualify for the 5th Edition of the Botswana Games in 2017. This was the first time judo was introduced to the Games. Atang reached the Botswana Games podium twice, winning silver and gold, defeating a seasoned national

athlete. She was featured on BTV's national broadcast.

Atang is well-positioned to enroll in Botswana's National Judo Team, and potentially participate in the African Games in 2018 and the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo. We are proud of Atang and will continue to support her, and her peers, so that they can fully unlock their potential.

Trained Community Mobilizer Secures Access to Services for Struggling Family

When Joan,* one of our trained community mobilizers, came across a household with teenaged twins who were consistently absent from school, and a disabled child who was not accessing government services due to the caregiver's lack of knowledge, she knew exactly what to do.

She supported the family in qualifying for the Department of Social Services' food basket

program, as well as a travelling voucher for people living with the disabilities. She also ensured they were referred to Motswedi Rehabilitation Centre for people leaving with disabilities.

Trained school-based facilitators conducted school monitoring visits for the twins and made the guidance teacher aware of their situation. The guidance teacher intervened

by providing the twins with necessary support.

Remarkably, both of the twins noticeably improved and no longer derailed from their studies. Harassment by other students subsided. The twins will write their Form 3 (Grade 10) exams later this year.

Enhancing Child Protection through Systems-Strengthening

Communities have a tremendous influence on the wellbeing of our children. Our 'Ke Boikarabelo Jwa Rona' (Setswana for "It's our Responsibility") project sought to improve the response to and prevention of Child Sexual Abuse (CSA) cases through improved service quality and reporting and enhanced community ownership of the Botswana Children's Act.

SSI conducted research on the preparedness of service providers to handle child sexual abuse and exploitation cases. As a result, 10 key recommendations, based on modeling, were developed to improve the response to child sexual abuse and prevent this heinous crime in the future. We circulated a petition in Botswana and internationally for people to support change, garnering 21,400 signatures of solidarity.

SSI worked with service providers (police, social workers, health care providers, magistrates and educators) using a scorecard system that enabled them to assess their preparedness for handling child sexual abuse cases and develop registers to collect all pertinent information.

We strengthened community ownership by training 13 Child Protection Committees on the Children's Act and issues related to child sexual abuse in four project sites. Every committee developed an action plan to educate their communities, and promote the implementation of the Children's Act (focused on Section 56: Right of protection from neglect, and Section 25: Right of protection from sexual abuse and exploitation). Through the committees' targeted outreach activities, they have engaged a total of 1213 community members.

The House of Chiefs committed themselves to take part in the first-ever expert meeting with legal partners, initiated by Stepping Stones International.

The 'Ke Boikarabelo Jwa Rona' program on Radio Botswana 2 (RB2) engaged a diverse panel of guests to speak out on child protection issues. The guests included partner organisations, champions of child protection work and survivors of sexual abuse and exploitation.

Survivors added a human side to the issues and encouraged those who have not spoken out, to do so.

Red Card Campaign

The Red Card campaign utilizes the concepts of football where, when a serious offence is committed, a Red Card is issued. Child Protection Committees distributed the Red Cards to people in the community and sensitized them about gender based violence. The campaign is designed to mobilize communities to blow the whistle and hold each other accountable to social ills, such as sexual harassment, beating a partner and defilement, to name but a few.

'Finding the Leader Within' Prepares Youth for Success



The FACET Foundation built the Graff Leadership Center in 2011. Since the initial opening of the center, more than 300 young people have participated in the "Finding the Leader Within" leadership program. The Graff Center has hosted over 72 training sessions to educate and build the capacity of staff members and the community in child protection, leadership, organizational capacity, literacy, gender based violence, and the list continues. "Finding the Leader Within" has expanded to our partner, Baylor, who implements the program in the capital city of Gaborone.

In 2017, 81 out of school youth graduated from the "Finding the Leader Within" program with increased confidence, skills and ambitions. Half of the out of school youth successfully completed job shadowing placements.

Youth Build STEM Skills in Design Squad Global Club

Children explore engineering through fun-packed, high-energy, hands-on activities—and they partner with a Design Squad club from a different country! 10 youth in the after school program participated in an international pilot project with the Association of Science & Technology Centre, partnering with Technopolis, a science house in Belgium.

The experience has boosted the self-confidence of the participants, as they are now able to articulate themselves with peers across the world who

are excited about using science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) to solve challenges in their communities. Individual donors continue to support the program through the Global Giving platform.



We first learned of Stepping Stones International when it was just starting. For us, it was a matter of faith – we saw Lisa as a person very passionate about helping children, in a difficult context. Over the years, we've read the stories in e-newsletters and on the website. It's remarkable how much the program has grown, and how they have managed to mobilize the right supports for these children.

‘Breakthrough to English’ Literacy Program Embraced by Ministry of Basic Education

After training 420 teachers and out of school facilitators in the Whole Class and Next Steps University of Utah Reading Clinic's (UURC) literacy curriculum, 22 schools across Botswana have seen improvements in English literacy. The initiative was supported by Botswana Insurance Holdings Limited (BIHL), as part of their ‘Adopt a School’ corporate social responsibility initiative. As a result, the Ministry is working with SSI and UURC to include the “Breakthrough to English” program in the curriculum. SSI and UURC are conducting Whole Class literacy courses with the Education Department at the University of Botswana. The Department of Out of School Education and Training (OSET), in partnership with the Ministry of Basic Education, sent three educators who passed the master trainer course, to attend classes at the University of Utah Reading Clinic (USA), where they received three Masters credits.



Art Therapy Helps Youth Start the Healing Process

We provide integrative counselling, which is a combined approach to psychotherapy that brings together different elements of specific therapies. Integrative counselling takes the view that there is no single approach that can treat each client in all situations. Each person's needs are considered as a whole and counselling techniques are tailored to their individual needs and personal circumstances.

One such technique is art and drama therapy, which allows the child to express him or herself without feeling pressured to verbalize and, at the same time, the child starts the healing process.

Expert psychologists and psychotherapists from Canada and the U.S. donated their time to train Stepping Stones International staff in Solution-Focused Brief Therapy (SFBT) which is "hope-friendly." Our psychosocial department uses SFBT to uncover clients' histories of strength,

resources, successes, coping and positive intention, thus building hope for clients, which fosters positive therapeutic change. These conversations also contribute to an "atmosphere of activated resources" that is a prerequisite for therapeutic change.

I am a 21-year-old student, and I joined Stepping Stones through, «Eine Welt Netz,» a German volunteering program. I worked mainly with the Life Skills department, and supported the whole of the organization. The experience taught me humility and gratitude, because every child I worked with was loving, caring and full of energy.

I grew personally and professionally, both from my interaction with the youth, as well as with Batswana staff (people of Botswana). Although Germany and Botswana have very different cultures, I learned to take the role of listener and observer, and became very adaptive and appreciative of diverse backgrounds.

Summary of Our Financials

The majority of Stepping Stones International's income originates primarily from foundations. This is comprised of donations from the Stephen Lewis Foundation and For Africa's Children Every Time (FACET). FACET was established by Mr. Laurence Graff of Graff Diamonds.

Our bilateral or sub-grants come from donor governments, other NGOs and foundations. Bilateral agreements include grants from the European Union, Project Concern International, funded under USAID, the Canadian Fund and a small portion from the Botswana-Baylor Children's Clinical Center of Excellence.



- 39% Bilateral/Subgrant
- 55% Foundations
- 1% Individual Giving
- 4% Private Sector
- 1% Government of Botswana

In 2017, private sector funding comprised Botswana Insurance Holdings Limited (BIHL) for literacy and Barclays Bank Botswana for the "Ready to Work" employment-readiness program. Other in-kind donations from the private sector came from Bokomo, Woolworths and Pie City for the nutrition program.

The Government of Botswana, Ministry of Basic Education supported SSI to implement the University of Utah Reading Clinic program.

Individual giving encompasses the smallest portion of SSI's funding, and is due to grow in 2018 onwards.
