World AIDS Day

Our theme for this year was 'I'll be there for my brother or sister living with HIV" and our guest speaker was a young man Bernard Meyer who has been living with HIV for 15 years. He shared his challenges of being rejected by friends and how it took him five years to work up courage the share his status with his mother. But when he did he said 'I can face anything now that I know my mother has my back'. He added 'I am the embodiment of grace - I wouldn't be here if it wasn't for unconditional love'.

A wonderful candlelight memorial was held this year, with 270 member from 8 support groups and churches. Bishop Garth encouraged us with his message and fellowship was shared over a hot plate of delicious stew.

Outing for support groups

Undeterred by strong winds, a lovely outing was held with fifteen members to St James beach. They shared how important the support groups have become in their lives, as the group has become their family. One of the members shared how before she joined support group she kept losing her jobs because she had to go to the clinic all the time and once they knew her status they didn't want to employ her. But now with skills she has learned at the empowerment group she can pay her rent and support her

PREVENTION PROGRAMMES

Three training camps were held for the Agents of Change peer education programme at the beginning of the year. The youth leader becomes the facilitator and young people are trained as peer educators.

They then run a twenty session life-skills programme back in their church and community. The programme covers risky behaviour: HIV&AIDS, teenage pregnancy, STIs. drugs and alcohol


At our first quarterly gathering we offered Voluntary HIV testing and counselling and the majority of the youth participated



At our second gathering we had feedback from the sessions and shared lessons learned, as well as looking at issues of cultural diversity and xenophobia following threats of xenophobic outbreaks after the World Cup. The third gathering was in the form of a 'surf walk' where churches came together to bond and share ideas and we end the year with a certification ceremony.

The evaluation of the Agents of change programme is drawing to a close, which compared our intervention churches (running the programme) with 'control' churches not running the programme. The results are that Agents of Change is making a significant difference in terms of raising the age of sexual debut of the youth who are not yet sexually active (abstinence), and increasing condom use amongst those who are already sexually active.

Because of the high levels of sexual coercion in South Africa (we have the reputation for the being the country with the highest number of rapes, of any country which is not at war) we have incorporated some new sessions, looking at gender and abuse. We have just published our new manual

ORPHANS AND VULNERABLE CHILDREN

Fikelela Children's Centre

At the Fikelela Children's centre we offer short term residential care for orphans and abandoned children. They are then placed back into the community with trained foster parents. We have realised that there are often cases of children who are placed by social workers with us who have not done a thorough screening to see if there are extended family members. So our social worker has started to look for extended family members. The wonderful news is that this year we have managed to place 27 children back with extended family members. This often involves a lot of detective work!



Zonnebloem Cottage

This has been a year of growth for this special foster care home, where Emmie and Raymond care for their six children. Coming from very difficult backgrounds the children all finished the year with award certificates! We have formed a special bond with Bishops School and they fundraised for a second bathroom (eight people fighting to use one bathroom was interesting!), which has been a wonderful blessing.




One of our focuses for 2011 will be to look at strategies to encourage more people to foster, through having information evenings throughout the Diocese. There are now an estimated 82,000 orphans in Cape Town, each one with their own individual stories of hurt and challenge.
